MPHL Curriculum Review Updates


In October STM stakeholders gathered to review the MPHL curriculum. These included MPHL alumni, faculty, founders, board members and staff.

Antishock garments save lives in MBFHI sites

In 2023 Save the Mothers donated 25 Non-Pneumatic Anti-Shock Garment (NASGs) to six hospitals: Kawolo Hospital, St. Francis Hospital Naggalama, Mukono General Hospital, St. Francis Nyenga Hospital, Mukono Church of Uganda Hospital, and Buvuma Health Centre IV. The partners led by Dr Mushin Nsubuga STMEA Executive Director joined in the implementation of activities that included MPHL alumni, Mother Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative (MBFHI), and Seed fund follow-up engagements.

Student-Alumni engagement: STM met MPHL student, Jackson Kadumye at the Ministry of Health, Kampala to discuss how the MPHL program informs and impacts his work in the field of health promotion. The team was received by Jackson's supervisor, Dr Richard Kabanda, Commissioner Health Promotion.

STM also followed up alumni Goretti Aanyu working in a school with children with disabilities in Mukono, central Uganda and Moses Kyangwa working with Busoga Health Forum in Jinja City, eastern Uganda.

MBFHI sites follow up visits:

STM visited four of its 15 MBFHI sites to support ongoing maternal and newborn health initiatives aimed at safe, dignified and respective care.

At Kawolo Hospital STM donated a baby warmer in the maternity unit. At Mukono General Hospital STM donated two incubators for the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. These equipment are very key for saving lives of newborns.

Seed Fund: In Manafwa district, eastern Uganda STM met 8 of the women groups it supports with a seed fund and goats for economic empowerment aimed at promoting access to maternal and newborn health services. STM awarded groups with best practices a top-up seed fund. Rev Moses Mukholi MPHL alumnus ioined STM.

Through a multidisciplinary approach, we continue to strengthen safe motherhood practices across Uganda.

During the follow up visit in Sept 2025 health workers shared their experiences of using NASG to manage excessive bleeding. Mothers whose lives have been saved also spoke to STMEA.

Midwife Yudaya at Kawolo Hospital, Buikwe district central Uganda said: "Before, we lost many mothers on the way to referral hospitals. Now, with the NASG, we stabilize them and it has changed everything."

Fazira Naigagga from Bujunta village, Nyenga -Buikwe district is a mother of two babies. She almost lost her life due to excessive bleeding after birth. Fazira was referred to Kawolo Hospital, unconscious and bleeding heavily.

Health workers managed Fazira and saved her life using NASG. Sr Barbara Nekesa a midwife at Kawolo hospital says: Since we got NASG in 2023 to date, Kawolo Hospital has not lost a mother due to excessive bleeding just because of the use of NASG.

STM's NASG intervention directly supports WHO's postpartum haemorrhage guidelines and contributes to Sustainable Development Goal 3: reducing maternal mortality worldwide.

Every year, 287,000 mothers die from preventable causes, most from postpartum hemorrhage. Nearly 95% of these deaths occur in Sub-Saharan Africa. The Non-Pneumatic Anti-Shock Garment (NASG) is one of the simple tools helping to save lives of mothers due postpartum hemorrhage. NASG is a simple and low-cost device that is used in manage excessive bleeding in hospitals and during transit incase of a referral to save lives of mothers and newborns. When wrapped around a bleeding mother, the NASG applies gentle pressure that redirects blood flow to vital organs like the heart, lungs, and brain, stabilizing her until definitive treatment is instituted.

> During the outreach supported by ST-MEA, 112 pregnant women received ANC services and over 70 babies were immunized. The first ANC attendance in

the area has since risen significantly.
